'm excited about our new series on the book of Revelation beginning Jan. 2, at Charity. Revelation 1:3 states, "Blessed is the one who reads aloud the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear it and take to heart what

is written in it because the time is near."

I believe the Lord wants each one of us to experience the blessing of reading His Word, period, but especially these words in this amazing book He has given to us. When I told a friend from our church about my excitement over this series, she exclaimed, "Are you trying to scare us!" I laughed but realized that we often respond with fear to the book of Revelation or anything having to do with end-times teaching or theology. And I

think that response is natural whenever we come face-to-face with any change or a challenge to our reality in this day-byday life we are living.

The Book of Revelation also brings a certain kind of doom and gloom kind of perspective or attitude, which I DO NOT believe is God's intent in giving this book to us. If we have a Heavenly Father who absolutely loves us so much that he was willing for his SON to die on the cross for us and if we have a Savior who was born into this world as his creation (which we celebrate at Christmas) and then willingly WENT TO THE CROSS out of love for us and then promised that "I WILL COME AND GET YOU, so that you will always be with me where I am," we have a Father God and Son of God that has such good things for us and reveals it through His Word and the gift of the Holy Spirit.

You may wonder why we would start with Revelation instead of some other

Why do Prayer Ministry?

Let them pray. Is anyone happy? Let them sing songs of praise. Is anyone among you sick? Let them call the elders of the church to pray over them and anoint them with oil in the name of the Lord. And the prayer offered in faith will make the sick person well" (James 5:13-15).

Charity is a place for healing where changed lives are gifted and empowered by the Holy Spirit and released to serve in the community for the glory of Christ (Charity Vision Statement).

Over the past few months, you may have noticed some changes in how we offer prayer ministry at Charity, both in frequency and visibility. We have provided prayer ministry in some form for several years.

We offered prayer ministry once a month using a panel in the sanctuary to provide privacy for quite some time. In recent months, those who have a heart for prayer have been meeting with Pastor Sam to discuss how we might improve Prayer Ministry at Charity and make others more aware of this ministry. One of the things that we first talked about was a desire to offer prayer weekly. We committed prayer support for those in need after each Sunday service at the end of October.

Why do we desire to have a prayer ministry team at Charity? First of all, we are commanded to in the scriptures. The book of James calls us to pray for those in trouble or who are sick and anoint them with oil. We pray by faith for healing. We do not bring healing.

We are his vessels. How God brings healing is up to Him. It may happen right away. It may occur over time. Sometimes healing is one of those mysteries that we can't figure out. But, I believe God does heal. By His stripes, we are healed (Isaiah 53:5).

Secondly, our vision statement states, "we are called to be a place of healing." Prayer may not change our circumstances, but it can change us. I have heard somebody say (I don't know who) that sometimes God calms the storm, and other times He calms His child. I have found this to be true in my own life. We are strengthened by the prayers of others and empowered by the Holy Spirit to go out and share His good

news with others that need to hear it. Finally, Jesus tells us that his house will be called a "house of prayer" (Matthew 21:13). I believe all churches are called to be houses of prayer.

Perhaps you are anxious about coming forward for prayer after a service. Maybe you don't want to stand up front because you're afraid others will see you getting prayer and judge you for it. I get it. It's not easy to be vulnerable. It's not easy to ask for help. But asking for help is not a sign of weakness. The opposite is true. It takes strength to ask for help. We all have times when we need to ask for help. You were not meant to handle life on your own. It is the job of the body of Christ to lift you up and encourage you when you need that and rejoice with you in times of joy.

I pray we can all get to the point where we will have less shame in asking for help and more acceptance of each other.

Having said that, if you still feel more comfortable just sitting, feel free to come to the front row, and our prayer ministers will meet you there. Perhaps you prefer not to be anointed by oil or have somebody lay hands on you. That is acceptable. We will ask for your permission to do that first. It is not a requirement for your healing.

What if it is not you in need of prayer, but perhaps a loved one? Our prayer ministers will gladly join you in prayer on behalf of your loved one. Do you have a burden for our country? For the church? We will take it to the Lord in prayer and offer your concerns up to God.

Would you like to receive a blessing from the Lord or offer up a prayer of praise and thanksgiving for an answered prayer? We will gladly lift that to Him. He delights in your praises. You can be confident that your prayer request will remain confidential and not shared except in the case of a threat to yourself or somebody else.

We will not counsel you. We are not trained counselors. If we feel you might benefit from further counsel, we might suggest you talk to Pastor Sam. We, as Prayer Ministers, are all a work in progress. We are not perfect. We learn as we go. I believe the more we rely on the Holy Spirit, the more He will grow us and equip us to increase the effectiveness of our ministry. But, He will use us where we are. It's not about us. It's all about Him.



FREEDOM IN CHRIST


Monday, March 7 through Monday, May 9 6:30-8:30 p.m.

Marian Fluharty and Brenda Whitman will lead this class. Minimum class size 6.








