Intentional Interim Senior Pastor Brad Miller Charity Prophecy - Next Season

To say that Charity is a unique congregation, would be an overwhelming understatement. One of the things that makes us particularly unique is the fact that we have been guided for two decades by a prophetic word that has been a key component of Charity's identity. {See that prophecy on page 4} Early in my tenure here. I realized that reflecting upon and praying about that prophecy would be essential for having this Intentional Interim be a fruitful pivot point toward Charity's future. So, after much prayer and many conversations, on March 12th I shared my impressions about the validity and meaning of the prophecy moving forward. If you missed it, you can watch it online (see how on page 4). Please note, though much of my ministry involves helping congregations plan for the future, I claim no particular prophetic spiritual gifting. What follows is the result of prayerful contemplation and rational observations; only the leaders and disciples of Charity can prayerfully discern if my impressions accurately summarize God's will for Charity.

The Bonsai Decade Must End -

Over the past decade, Charity has repeatedly been the victim of sheep-stealers who want "their own" church without being troubled to proclaim the Good News to fresh ears. That needs to stop. Our primary purpose is not to provide sacrificial cuttings so that other churches have an easy "instant church."

Charity Should Function at Scale -

We have a building and a staff model that are optimized around a general size. Each time that the sheep-stealers have come collecting fleeces, we have rebounded. Still, the years of rebuilding are always a time of stress. We need to grow back to the size that we function ideally at: something like 300 to 500 AWWA (Average Weekly Worship Attendance).

Charity Should Plan and Plant a Not-Neighboring Church – The instinct to plant churches is good, it just needs to be done in a strategic and God-honoring way.

Executive Director of Ministries Doug Leet Where Charity and Love Are...

It was the spring of 1989. I just turned 29 and Rhonda was 27 when we had our first child. Eric. Having recently moved back to Bismarck, we found ourselves hosting Pastor Bob Nordvall in our small apartment for a pastoral visit. I don't remember what initially brought us to Charity (the Holy Spirit was definitely involved), but the welcoming atmosphere we found here made us feel a part of a faith family.


"'Where Charity and love are, there is God.' St. John," was the inscription on the 10th Anniversary coffee mug we received when we joined. Pastor Bob had been at Charity only four years, and had just come through a lot of turmoil himself with pastor issues. We were a small congregation back then, and now we find ourselves in that place again.

What attracted us to Charity then is different, I believe, from what we see as "attractional" churches are currently offering. It's where we grew in faith by concentrating on the basics of our congregational calling. This current congregation has inherited a solid foundation on which to build. With reliance on God, we need to go no further than the preamble to Charity's constitution for guidance:

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit Amen. Created in God's Image, redeemed by His Son, empowered by His Holy Spirit, the congregation is called to:

 Proclaim the Gospel of Jesus Christ (Matthew 28:19-20)

- Administer the Sacraments (Mark 14:22-25)
- Study the Scriptures (Ephesians 4:11-16)
- Instruct the youth and provide for their spiritual welfare (Matthew 19:13-14)
- Witness to the community, nation, and world (II Timothy 2:15, Acts 1:18)

- Help those in need (I John 3:17)
- And practice responsible stewardship (I Peter 4:10-11)

The work that lies ahead of us in rebuilding ministries will be challenging. But it's times like these that present opportunities, and our biggest opportunity is to let Jesus into our lives. It's when we open ourselves up to His leading, individually and as a congregation, that we'll be most fruitful. We need to be a praying community. At the risk of overdoing it, I will again quote noted Norwegian theologian, O. Hallesby. Yes, O. is for Ole, and he wrote a whole book on prayer:

"Notice carefully every word here. It is not our prayer which draws Jesus into our hearts. Nor is it our prayer which moves Jesus to come in to us. All He needs is access. He enters in of His own accord. because He desires to come in. To pray is nothing more involved than to let Jesus into our needs, and permitting Him to exercise His own power in dealing with them. And that requires no strength. It is only a question of our wills. Will we give lesus access to our needs?"

Charity is, if fact, a smaller congregation right now. Our average weekly service attendance is under 200. That

directly impacts our budget. As you can see in the accompanying financial chart on this page, through February, Charity has had almost \$30,000 less revenue than expenses. If that trend continues throughout the year, we will end up with a deficit of nearly \$200,000. Let us continue to let Jesus into our needs, individually and corporately. I love this sentence from Mike Fluharty's closing paragraph in his newsletter article this month, "So let us accept our challenges and trials joyfully with hope and love in our hearts for Him and each other." Amen!

Greetings from the Vision Council.

"Prayers For God's solutions to the difficulties and challenges facing Charity at this time and trusting that His Will be done". April's prayer for the weekly bulletin is a timely one. We would encourage all of you to add it to your daily prayers.

One of our challenges right now is the continuing search for a Worship Leader. The Vision Council is very thankful and grateful for everyone that has stepped up to serve through this transition, but we continue to search for a longer-term solution. Please pray with us that God moves the heart of the person he has gifted with this talent to step forward to lead our worship team.

We are also very close to finalizing a new job description for the Youth Director position. All of the last year's challenges have certainly reduced the numbers in our youth programs but has not in any way reduced the Vision Council's belief in the importance of the youth ministry. Keep this position in your prayers.

Now we need to talk about the budget. Doug does a good job putting the numbers out there so you can see our monthly income is falling short of our expenses. While that can never be described as a good thing, should we be concerned, very concerned, anxious, or overwhelmed with despair? At this point in time the Vision Council, Staff, and Treasurer are concerned but continue to be faithful to God's plan for us. Charity has been blessed by God with resources and past leadership that set some of those resources aside anticipating lean years or challenging transitions. By no means are these resources inexhaustible but if properly administered will see us through this transition and period of regrowth. Continued prayers for responsible stewardship, adherence to good governance, prayerful discernment for God's will in all things, and your faithful giving will see us through these circumstances also.

With all of these challenges before us we also need to give thanks to our Lord for the gift of our salvation. As we celebrate Easter we need to reflect on the price He has already paid for our sins to be forgiven and welcomed into his Kingdom. So let us accept our challenges and trials joyfully with hope and love in our hearts for Him and each other. May you all have a Blessed Easter and may the Holy Spirit move your heart to feel the peace and joy that comes from following our Lord and Savior.

We can learn and serve the kingdom by patiently planning and implementing the launch of a church that is at least 50 miles (and maybe 500 or 1000 miles) away from 120 Aspen Avenue.

Charity Should Continue Global & Local Impact – Charity's rich history of supporting nearby and far away ministry projects predates the 2000 prophetic word, but it has continued robustly during that era. We ought to use the prophetic word as a guide in choosing among the innumerable benevolence options presented to us. Ministries that offer shelter or haven (though not too literally) should get a higher percentage of our benevolence resources.


Disciplemaking Must be Reclaimed – Our current Constitution has its origin near the time of the prophetic word. It boldly opts for "Disciple" language in place of "Member" language. In order for Charity to stand, and to stand, and to continue to stand we need active and growing and multiplying disciples. Disciples served faithfully through recent trials, but we realized that our processes for developing all into disciples had collapsed – one example being the omission of catechesis. Making disciples has to become a central activity again.

Use of the Scaffolding Must be Normalized – Scaffolding has come to have a secondary meaning of general supporting structure in organizations. Metaphorically, it works just like the mechanical platforms used in construction and maintenance. Over the past decade, too many voices suggested that we didn't need our scaffolding. Charity's organizational scaffolding include: Holy Scripture, the Lutheran Confessions, our LCMC relationship, and our governing documents. They are all for regular use – they should not be reserved for emergencies and special occasions!

Please pray about the above six points and share your prayerful discernments with the Vision Council.

Finally, I will be sticking around a bit longer – The Vision Council and I have prayerfully concluded that it would be ideal to know that we are fully pastorally staffed as we head into the summer and prepare for a busy autumn. Therefore, we have agreed to an extension of my Intentional Interim Senior Pastor contract to cover June, July, and August. I remain absolutely ineligible for the regular Call vacancy which the Call Committee continue to make good process toward filling.

stephen at Charity Lutheran

Stephen Ministry Leadership would like to thank Charity Lutheran Congregation for all your continued support and prayers for our ministry here at Charity. Our new Stephen Ministers (SM) have not only continued their initial training, been commissioned, been attending their continuing education training, have joined all the other Stephen Ministers in our Bi-weekly Supervision meetings. but one of our new male SM has been assigned a Care Receiver. Our Ministry is lay congregation members of Charity who are trained to provide confidential one-to-one care to those (care receivers) experiencing a difficult time in their life (grief, divorce, job loss, illness, relocation, etc....). SMs come from all walks of life, but they all share a passion for bringing Christ's love and care to people during a time of need. After a Care Receiver (CR) is matched with a Stephen Minister, that SM meets with that person on a weekly basis to listen, care, encourage, and provide emotional and spiritual support. The caring relationship lasts as long as the need for care exists, or when the CR feels comfortable enough with their situation, they decide to end the relationship. The relationship has no time limit.



Currently Charity has fourteen trained SMs and of those, 6 are matched with a CR. If you, or someone you know is interested in or in need of a SM, please call the church office 258-1228.

Charity Call Committee Report

Call Committee Chair Beth Allen presented a report to the congregation on March 5 regarding the response to the Senior Pastor job position that was posted on the LCMC website and elsewhere the end of January. We have responded to several inquiries, answering questions individuals have had about the position and asking for additional information from them.

We conducted an interview via Zoom with one candidate and are moving forward with further consideration of this candidate and others. We met with the Vision Council on March 21 for further discussion and direction and hope to have more contact with other candidates after Easter.

Steven & Robin Ose - Cru

Greetings Charity!

We are Steven and Robin Ose together with our boys Stevie (19) and J.J. (18). You may remember my father Roger who passed in 2018 after decades of partnering with Charity on farm projects in the developing world. My mother Janet is in a care center by us and is living with dementia at this stage. Our boys are in college and excited to grow in faith and academics. Stevie is at Bethany Lutheran College studying business, while J.J. is at the U of MN studying mechanical engineering.

Cru is a missions agency started by Bill and Vonette Bright in 1951 with a goal of reaching the world for Christ. It has grown to 72 plus ministries in the U.S. and expanded to almost every country on earth. The goal is still the same, reach the world for Christ. Our vision is pretty simple, "So that everyone would know someone who truly follows Jesus." Pray with us to that end!

We serve with Cru in two key areas: 1) helping mobilize missionaries for the harvest nationally and internationally; as well as, 2) teaching in the Cru seminary. We are in the middle of spring break season which means "missions" for Cru. Over 2,000 Cru college students are reaching out with the gospel primarily overseas while their peers are sitting on the beach in Florida. Many thousands will hear the gospel as a result. College students in Toulouse, France to farmers in rural Columbia are hearing the gospel because Cru students tsaid, "Here am I, send me."

We also mobilize long-term missionaries. The most recent are a couple from College of Ozarks who will be serving with the campus team in Slovakia. They will be raising up disciples on the college campuses there with the goal of helping send graduates into Eastern Europe as missionaries.

Our second key objective is to equip new Cru missionaries for the harvest. Four times a year I (Steven) teach in person or online, New Testament and Introduction to Missions. New staff with Cru take these two seminary courses helping prepare them to carry God's word to the nations. It is academically rigorous but also focused on their discipleship. It is a joy to be able to build into their spiritual formation!

The year 2001 seems like yesterday when I was sitting with Karen Nordvall in the missions committee at Charity, sharing about our mission work in East Asia. Charity has been a faithful partner with us since then! Thank you! You are helping fulfill the Great Commission!



Sunday, April 16 2:00-3:30pm Charity Lutheran Church


