The Resurrection of Our Lord

We are now into the Easter Season on the Church Calendar. This is a great time in the church year. Everything that Jesus came for has been accomplished, except for the Ascension. We now have every opportunity to have the brokenness of sin reversed. To be sure, our physical nature still has to deal with the effects of sin, but our spiritual relationship with God has been completed. God does this through the giving of the Holy Spirit, to soften up our hard-heartedness, to grant us the gift of faith. Ephesians 2:8-9 reveals the extent of God's grace to us. "For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast."

This is pure gift! For this we thank and praise God. We are then prepared to serve God by loving others as God has chosen to love us, and to serve others with this good news!

On the Church Calendar, there are 6 Sundays of Easter. So expect to hear all about what the Gospel writers have to say about this marvelous gift - the life, death and resurrection of Jesus. But one thing we must also keep in mind is that the process is not complete until the Ascension of Jesus. Jesus explains this for us in this teaching to the disciples, and to us, about the gift of the Holy Spirit. Read the 16th chapter of John. Jesus has a complete explanation about when the Holy Spirit comes and what will be accomplished with this gift.

It is my hope and prayer that each one of us will be blessed during this season. To come to faith is to give your life over to God. God will lead you and guide you as you continue your journey through the 'wilderness' of this world, and bring us to the promised land when the time is ready.

Once again, the church calendar is an easy format to strengthen your spiritual journey through life. It has been prepared for us during centuries of experience. We do not need to re-invent a process. I find it useful and refreshing. I hope you do as well.

Executive Director of Ministries Doug Leet Unity in Christ

There is a divine goodness in the variety of God's creation. Repeatedly, during the days of creation as recorded in Genesis. God examined what he had spoken into existence, "And saw that it was good." Especially when man, male and female, were added to his creation, "And God saw everything that he had made, and behold, it was very good. And there was evening and there was morning, the sixth day." (emphasis mine) Genesis 1:31.

Charity used to have a sign made of wooden cutout letters that said. "Charity Lutheran" and was affixed to the diagonal retaining wall that's on the corner of Washington Street and Aspen Avenue. Early on in my employment at Charity, I was informed that there had been discussion when it was installed whether to leave the "Lutheran" part off to attract more people. Another current observation I have in following the Facebook page "Bismarck's People Reporting News," is that periodically someone will pose a question about where to go to church. Invariably, there will be several comments touting "nondenominational" as a selling point to visit their church. Interestingly, that comment shows up at times even when their church happens to be a member of a denomination! And there are those that say that denominations are obsolete and have outlived their purpose due to changing demographics, technology, and what seems to be dying mainline denominations.

There is evidence of major challenges over the past decades including declining attendance, more of the younger generation staying away and classified as so-called "nones" listing no affiliation, fewer people being called into pastoral

ministry, etc. This is happening not only denominationally, but churchwide.

These feelings are understandable, as many people have lived experiences with churches, whether from conflict and division within or between churches, experiences with the heavy-handedness of denominational hierarchy, or just plain having bad experiences with people or clergy in the church.

The Body of Christ is made up of all believers...the universal church. We can expect that there will be no denominations in heaven, and as believers, we will have perfect unity in Christ. But on this side of eternity, the Body of Christ is still made up of a fallen humanity and different interpretations of theology and doctrinal differences will continue. This fact does not mean there needs to be disunity and disconnectedness. C.S. Lewis attempted to show this when he focused on the core beliefs that all Christians hold in his book of common, or "mere" Christianity. There have been, and will continue to be, churches that practice ecumenism across denominations.



Mission Mexico International

It is with joy in my heart that I contact you personally through this letter. Months come and go, and we continue our involvement in a ministry that in the eyes of God is significant, as we see people living their lives, growing in their faith and advancing the kingdom of God.

As many of you know I am the founder of Mission Mexico International (MMI) and at the same time the Director of Ministry in Mexico. I have lived in Monterrey since I started this ministry in February of 1991. God has been with us since then. We have seen the actions of God in us and through us. I started alone, always supported by a group of churches and individuals from the Midwest of the U.S. and a few from other states like Arizona. Thank God for his faithfulness toward this ministry and participation in the spreading of the gospel.

These last three years God has blessed our community in Monterrey with lots of babies. Our church is a young congregation. Many of our youth got married and started forming families. This brings lots of joy into our hearts and God continues blessing us with new people every day.

One of our dreams as we started this MMI ministry was to expand it and take it into other states in our beloved country. As a response from God toward our desire, it began to happen. Our ministry is a small organization. We have been very faithful to our Lutheran roots and also to the purity of the gospel and the preaching of the Scriptures without adulterating them. Because of that we remain small and consistent. We branched out our ministry to Rio Bravo, a fairly large city toward the border of Texas. We sent Pastor Victor Barbosa and his beautiful wife Lucy Castor and their three children who are Adriana, Santiago and Sebastian. Two of them are teenagers and one is a pre-teen. They are so committed to their church that many people from the community where they serve are very attracted to their ministry. In fact, there is a group of youth who gathers every week with them and most of the kids are members of Sebastian's soccer team. It is so beautiful to see the pastor's kids being a beacon of the light of Christ in the area. Lucy has friends from different activities in the community who became Christian just because of her friendship. This church's name is Good Shepherd Lutheran and they are always interacting with the community in different ways such as Christmas celebrations, children's day, Mother's Day, etc. Pastor Victor and Lucy were serving on the Parents directive organization of the school where their kids study. So, we are very pleased with the involvement of the pastoral family in the community.

Juan Vazquez is our other pastor who planted a church in Monterrey and was called by God to move to the big metro area of Guadalajara. That city is located about 12 hours from Monterrey to the west. Juan left Monterrey 10 years ago just asking God to guide him. During those 10 years he was able to establish a house church that strove to survive the odds of life such as not having a permanent place to meet, and the Pandemic. Thank God they have overcome all the difficulties and are still functioning. The House church is called Family of God Lutheran Community Church. At the same time Pastor Juan was offered a ministry among the Huichol Tribe in the state of Nayarit. He would travel 4 hours towards the ocean in the mountains in order to bring the word to that group together with food and clothing. That has been proven to be God's will and He has blessed the efforts. So Pastor Juan travels to that community 3-4 times per year. I have visited the ministry once.

As Pastor Juan and his wife Teresita and their children were looking for discernment from God on what to do next, the couple and their children, who are completely committed to serve alongside of their father and mother, and not knowing if Family of God will make it after the Pandemic, were introduced to a neglected Missouri Synod congregation named "All Saints Lutheran Church", which after wrongdoings of a former pastor and misdirection from the synod, decided to find a different Lutheran body to join. They even considered going with another denomination. But it was God's plan to expose Pastor Juan to that community since he arrived in Guadalajara 10 years before. So, they approached him and ask him to become their pastor. Pastor Juan put several conditions in order to decide if he could be their pastor. First, he said I have to consult this with my president Pastor Enrique Estrada. Secondly, I do not want to have anything to do with Missouri Synod or the Mexican equivalent, and lastly, you have to join MMI and LCMC. So, to make a long story short, I met with the council of the congregation in Guadalajara and explained to them what MMI was all about and of course LCMC.

Pooky's Triumph

Like a struggling butterfly, my grief will emerge into something beautiful and new

y mother, Marguerite Bretscher, died suddenly on July 4, 1998, at an airport as she and my father were returning home from vacation. Just 16 hours earlier she'd called to tell me of my niece's birth—her 22nd grandchild. When our conversation ended, I didn't know that I had told my mother good-bye for the last time.

The months following her death were filled with disbelief, emptiness and utter despair. Despite my upbringing in a Lutheran parsonage, I found that I desperately needed repeated reassurances of God's love and promises. As the Easter following my mother's death approached, I yearned for a visible metaphor of resurrection.

During Lent, our Sunday school youth raise mailorder caterpillars that are timed to enter into the chrysalis stage and emerge as butterflies for an Easter morning release. Maybe I should join them? Our family had released butterflies at my mother's burial service. So I brought home three caterpillars and named two of them Dot and Mildred in memory of my great-aunts. The third one I called by my mother's nickname, "Pooky."

On Holy Saturday morning, my children discovered Mildred, now a butterfly, hanging beside her chrysalis. Later that day we watched in awe as a newly created Dot appeared. By Easter morning we could see Pooky's orange and black wings within a transparent membrane breaking through her chrysalis. We hoped she would emerge soon so we could release her with Dot and Mildred in the Sunday school butterfly ceremony.

But on the long ride to church, traumatized perhaps by the moving car, Pooky violently trembled and struggled to break free. During Sunday school she became very still, and the chrysalis that entombed her blackened. She remained motionless as we drove home after church, quite in contrast to the way she had writhed on the trip earlier that morning. It weighed on me that the reassurance I so desperately sought was not forthcoming.

That afternoon, as we drove our two children back to college, I couldn't stop thinking about the dark, motionless chrysalis. "It's only a caterpillar. It doesn't matter that its name is Pooky," I told myself. "There will always be other caterpillars that you can name Pooky. Just pretend Dot or Mildred was Pooky. What difference does it make? It doesn't change anything."

Still, despair overwhelmed me on the ride home. "I killed this butterfly," I thought. "Why did I take it to church and upset it with the car ride? Whatever made me think it was a good idea to name it Pooky anyway?"

And then, "Why did God have to do this to me this Easter? Doesn't God understand what I'm going through right now? Couldn't God take care of one stupid little butterfly?"

I decided that in the morning I would take the chrysalis into the woods and leave it. Perhaps the butterfly was still alive and would emerge? I would never know, but I could always cling to that hope.

That evening I was reluctant to look in the butterfly cage, but some movement caught my eye. There sat a

butterfly, triumphantly fanning her wings.

Instantly I was struck by more than just the butterfly. Pooky was perched over her empty chrysalis, which was split open and withering. Under the chrysalis were red bloodlike stains of waste material from the hatching. Yet above these signs of death and struggle—a living butterfly!

That image remains a powerful metaphor, reassuring and resurrecting in its own right: the suffering, the pain, the hopelessness, the empty tomb, the ex-

hilarating joy, the new and glorious life. I began to see my grief as the traumatized struggling butterfly in the hands of a loving, merciful Father. I learned to trust that through God's grace something beautiful and new would emerge even in the face of my weakness, tears, pain and hopelessness. I, too, would live again, now and forever.

The Lord is risen! He is risen indeed! (And so has Pooky.)

We decided to install Juan and we had the Rev. Julie Smith representing LCMC and the president of the board of directors from MMI, Brett Johnson, together with me as the Director of the Ministry in Mexico. By the time Julie Smith left Guadalajara, and as she was transported by the president of the church council, they made the decision to become members of LCMC and MMI. Thanks be to God. The new congregation comes with a complete campus with everything in it. A big church building, many classrooms and a big yard and a parsonage. It really came as a blessing from God to us. Now we have a center of operations for the ministry in Guadalajara and Nayarit.

As you can see God is acting on our favor every day. We are proud to be Christian, Lutheran, Mexican and connected to LCMC. As I sent the Christmas Letter to Charity Lutheran, you can find interesting pictures that will show you some of our ministry happenings this past year.

I really thank you Charity for believing in our initiatives and continuing to support us in prayer and monetarily. Please continue doing so. We want to be obedient to Christ's call in sharing the Gospel wherever God will send us.


