Discovering Advent – A Season of Hope, Peace, Joy, and Love

Advent is the beginning of the new church year. It's a time to start anew and begin again. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin.

"to come" and is a time of preparation and anticipation for the coming of Christ at Christmas where we celebrate that Jesus, God's son, was born into our world. While many of us prepare for Christmas by shopping and decorating and trimming the tree, do you take time to prepare your heart for the birth of Jesus? Advent is a time to do that. Celebrating the Advent season can help us be more faithful disciples as we prepare for Christmas. To help celebrate Advent, let's turn our attention to each of the Advent candles and what they mean.

First Candle

Called the Prophets candle, the first Advent candle represents the prophets of the Old Testament, especially Isaiah, who waited in hope for the Messiah's arrival.

Second Candle

The second candle is frequently called the Bethlehem candle. Micah had foretold that the Messiah would be born in Bethlehem, which is also the birthplace of King David.

Third Candle

The third candle is referred to as the Shepherd's candle. On the third Sunday of Advent we celebrate the joy of Christmas. To the shepherd's great joy, the angels announced that Jesus came for humble, unimportant people like them, too. In liturgy, the color rose signifies joy.

Fourth Candle

The candle for the fourth Sunday of Advent is the Angel's candle. It represents the messengers who announced the birth of the Messiah.

" And, lo..."

We have a tradition in our family, as many of you may have, where I read the Christmas story as presented in the Gospel of Luke to our family on Christmas Eve. For most of the years since my kids were little, I used a nice large book that we received through Aid Association of Lutherans, which has somehow gone missing in recent years. But as I recall, it used the King James Version in the story. Now when I read the story out of my New International Version Bible, it seems not quite right after all these years.

As a comparison of Luke 2:9-10:

NIV - "**9** An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. **10** But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people."

KJV - "**9** And, lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid."

"**10** And the angel said unto them, Fear not: for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people."

It may just be me, but when reading these passages aloud, the King James Version just sounds more majestic. With this season of Advent upon us, a new reading of Luke 2:1-21 seemed to be in order. And there are a few things that stand out in the story. First, in all the majestic angelic glory in announcing the coming of a savior, an anointed king, Jesus arrived in the most **humble** of settings.

Secondly, "And the angel said unto them, 'Fear not:' " Jesus had told his disciples not to be afraid on different occasions too. If both the angelic host and Jesus says "*Fear not*" in scary circumstances, then that is good advice.

Thirdly, God is trustworthy. When the shepherds heard the message, they immediately acted on it, to "...find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger." These lowly shepherds decided to **trust and to act**.

And lastly, they spread the word, "And when they had seen it, they made known abroad the saying which was told them concerning this child. And all they that heard it wondered at those things which were told them by the shepherds." Again, these lowly shepherds went out to **share** the good news of the coming of the Savior.

So, I pray that with the Lord's help, my Christian walk is characterized by humility, no fear, trusting and acting, and sharing the good news of Jesus with others through my words and actions. Now, to find that book.

Greetings from the Vision Council. I hope everyone was able to stay safe and warm through November and it definitely looks like it is going to be a white Christmas. We needed the moisture, but I sure would have preferred a different delivery method. With all of the time spent moving snow it also gave me time to reflect on all the blessings I have to be grateful for. I do have a snowblower, all-wheel drive vehicle, warm house, a large and healthy family, and a wonderful church to serve in. God has blessed me with much, and even with shoveling snow and dealing with difficult circumstances, Thanksgiving is a great time to remember that. Like many of us I try to make every day one of thanksgiving with varying degrees of success. I am still a work in progress leaning heavily on God's grace and mercy though.

The Vision council has a number of issues we continue to deal with. Jessi Herz (Youth Director) has resigned as of November 13th. We do want to thank her for all she accomplished in the brief time she was serving at Charity and wish her the best in her future endeavors. Dallas Sailer is also resigning as treasurer at the end of the year. He has faithfully served in that position for eighteen years. Thank you so much for all those years of faithful service to Charity Lutheran. Doug and Dallas have been wrestling with the 2023 budget and have put together what should be very close to a final draft. You are all invited to the budget forum we will be holding on December 11th between services for a preview of it.

We have also been discussing the idea of dropping back to one service for Sunday worship. There has been no decision made on this, but the Vision Council would be very interested in your thoughts and feedback on this. Drop us an email, text, or catch one of us on a Sunday morning. We would really like to hear from you about this.

Weekly corporate prayer every Tuesday at 6:30 will also continue through January with the exception of December 20th and 27th. Thank you to all that have been attending and I invite all who can to attend.

Staff and the Vision Council continue to update the membership rosters. Thank you to all that have returned their attestation forms. A reminder mailing has been sent out to those who have not responded, and we encourage you to do so. If you wish to be considered a Voting Disciple, we really need to hear from you. Time is running out with the Annual Meeting being scheduled in early January.

As 2022 is coming to a close I have spent a little time reflecting on all we have been through as a church. A lot of turmoil, changes, and strife. There were many times I would lay awake and wonder if we were ever going to move forward again. But as I sit here reflecting, I realize we have been moving forward all along. It has been a long slow journey and difficult to measure, but there has been much progress. We are moving back to our governing documents, embracing and emphasizing the importance of our Lutheran doctrine. With a church membership as diverse as ours that was not accepted by all, and that led to our division and eventually to some feeling the need to leave. As much as that saddens me, I also believe it had to happen before a new pastor could succeed here. We are a Lutheran church, we are Spirit-led, and we are moving forward with healing, the call process, and all that God has called us to do. We have spent most of this year looking inward dealing with our internal issues. I feel most of that is now behind us and it is time to start looking outwards and engaging in the work God has given us; Expanding His Kingdom.

A Charity Mission Moment - LAMP

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. Philippians 4:6-7 (ESV)

Our journey started with a prayer – for guidance and wisdom to build a team from Madison, WI to travel to Easterville, MB to conduct a fun LAMP Vacation Bible School (VBS) for the children.

Two volunteers in January grew to nine volunteers by March, all excited about bringing the love of Jesus to Easterville. Our team consisted of a project manager, four teachers, two retirees, and two teenagers. Each had skills needed for our VBS week.

Our team began prayerful planning for the 1000-mile journey (each way). We reserved rental vans and hotels, conducted fundraising, and planned lessons, songs, and projects for that week. But, as we set out for our journey, many setbacks were encountered.

Anxious moments arose when our rental vans were smaller than expected. We prayed. After streamlining our packing, everything fit!

Then a team member tested positive. (By riding in two smaller vans, the two groups had remained socially distanced, which was miraculous in itself.) Our modified team of one van with only four volunteers was warmly welcomed by the teens in Easterville. With their help, we offered the full VBS week as planned.

Our full team of nine kept in touch daily. We prayed together for the needs of the on-site team who began each day tired. They shared pictures and stories and prayed they would minister to the children. The Lord provided perseverance.

By the middle of the week, exhaustion was setting in. Easterville was under heat advisories. The number of children attending fluctuated with many from the same extended family. We wondered if we were making a difference.

A team member visited the band office that day and met all of the Council members. Each one introduced themselves and shared their childhood VBS memories. They all had positive experiences and expressed gratitude that this ministry continues today. Perseverance through our many challenges DID make a difference in the lives of these children and the community!

Note: More than ever, the Indigenous people in northern Canada urgently need the hope that you and I have in Christ. A huge thank you to the members of Charity Lutheran for your ongoing support of the ministry of LAMP. You are on the front lines sharing the gospel with us!



You have said, "Seek my Face." My heart says to you, "Your face, Lord, do I seek." Psalm 27:8 ESV






Charity Children's and Youth Ministry Update Letter

To: All Charity parents, grandparents, and volunteers serving youth and children

It would be a profound understatement to declare that our youth ministry staffing transitions in the past few months have been complicated. Some of the disruptions that resulted were unavoidable – but some of the challenges were foreseeable. I apologize personally to all who were frustrated by changes and cancellations that we could have managed better. I woefully underestimated the extent to which some of our former staff would resort to deception, thievery, and dishonesty in their quest to build their private ministry empire. We won't resort to any of those tactics, but we will be better at communicating as we move forward.



• Charity is committed to serving all ages of kids with excellence. Nathaniel Oakland will be expanding his current duties to include coordination of youth ministry and children's ministry along with me. He will be the key point of contact on a temporary basis. Our fantastic volunteers will continue to carry out the specific ministries. All kid-related future staffing needs will be assessed and restructured with the input of the new Senior Pastor in 2023.

• Charity is committed to providing a solid Biblical education for kids of all ages. Our curricula moving forward will all be Bible-based. Charity kids will learn to use their Bibles and they will learn what is in those Bibles!

• Charity is committed to safety for our kids. Child safety protocols will no longer be a mere joke at Charity. The physical, emotional, and spiritual health of our kids is now a top priority. Staff will now be held to the same professional norms that are commonplace in reputable churches. Volunteers will be vetted and instructed regarding safety for all.

We will be continuing to offer a range of faith activities and educational programming on both Sundays and Wednesdays when we restart in January. Watch for communications from the church with new schedules starting in January. On December 7th, 11th, and 18th we will be hosting open houses on the lower level of the church building to connect with parents and volunteers. Christmas parties are planned for each age group during December. A ski trip and other activities are being planned for early 2023.

Nurturing our youngest members and encouraging them to grow in faith is both a great privilege and a great responsibility for Charity. I invite you to participate and I invite you to continue to pray for our young people and for all youth in God's vast creation.
