Indiana University (my Alma Mater) is having a pretty good year and if we were near their region (we are not) I would probably be tempted to look for a game ticket. Almost every relative of mine by birth or parental remarriage is a Purdue fan.

And Purdue is having an exceptionally good year. Long after IU loses, I will receive texts and Facebook messages gently reminding me about Purdue's progress. One of those fans is my beloved youngest brother – who incidentally has two degrees from IU and zero degrees from Purdue. March Madness is not a rational endeavor!

Bracketology (the art, science, or evil religion of picking the winners among every contest between the 68 teams) is a long series of "what-if" considerations. If you make too many wrong choices in the first round, then few of your hypothetical match-ups will actually occur in the second round.

Imagine what an insider scoop it would be if you knew the exact final match-up and you even knew the outcome? You could make huge bets in complete safety.

Charity Family

When a Pharisee, who was an expert in the law, tested lesus with the question: "Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?" Jesus replied: "'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind.' This is the greatest commandment. And the second is like it: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' All the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments." (Matthew 22:37-40 NIV), lesus was quoting Deuteronomy 6:5 and Leviticus 19:18 from the Old Testament.

In his brief answer, Jesus summarizes the whole of the Decalogue, the Ten Commandments that Moses brought down after forty days on Mount Sinai. His answer also lays the foundation for thinking about biblical stewardship. Bill High, from The Signatry, lays out five simple truths in his 5 Principles of Biblical Stewardship: 1) It's All God's; 2) It's Not Mine; 3) I'm Accountable; 4) There is Reward (and Loss); 5) Invest in Eternity (contact Charity's office for the 3 page pdf).

As was mentioned in the February newsletter article in this space, stewardship is "all-encompassing" and not just about money, but our view and handling of money and resources is a big part of it. The Bible has a lot to say about money and stewardship. Did you know that there are over 2,000 verses in the Bible concerning money, and that about a third of the parables that Jesus taught concerned money?

For this reason, we are looking to utilize Larry Burkett's series on stewardship over the summer months, either on Wednesday evenings or Sunday mornings (or both). The Stewardship Series includes four short books:

- Caretakers of God's Blessings (examines six key biblical passages on being faithful stewards)
- Where Your Treasure Is (compares our attitudes on money with what God teaches)
- Living on Borrowed Time (biblical teaching on borrowing and debt)
- Gifts from the Heart (giving to God what belongs to God)

Historically, January, following the largest giving month of the year, has not been a gangbuster revenue month in churches, Charity included. The financial chart on this page indicates that this year is no different. Charity's average monthly budgeted revenues (general fund giving) for 2023 is just under \$74,000. As you can see, Charity's revenue for January was just over \$44,000. Fortunately, January spending was not as high as budgeted, resulting in \$16,000 in actual expenses over actual revenue.

Thank you for your faithful giving to Charity, financially and otherwise. Consistent giving is the key to supporting Charity financially. While tithing is biblical, it should be done as a grateful response for God's grace, rather than a legalistic obligation. If you're giving a certain amount each week or month, pray about progressively increasing your giving towards ten percent of your income.



"Tipi Wakan (Sacred Tent)"

Dear Charity members, the Pastor, Deacons and members of Tipi Wakan Baptist Church in Cannon Ball, North Dakota send greetings in the name of our Lord, Jesus Christ.

We sincerely thank the body of Charity Lutheran for their generous and faithful donations to the work here on Standing Rock Sioux Reservation. Following is a brief explanation of the work of the ministry here made possible in part by your contribution.

As you may or may not know, three families have moved to North Dakota from Virginia to add workers for the harvest since 2015. We are so grateful for their decision to follow God's calling and complement the work here in their various capabilities. The following events and helps have been made possible with your contribution:

- Easter Egg Hunt April 2022: An annual Easter egg hunt is held for the children in the Cannon Ball community. Our last "hunt" had 50 community members in attendance.
- Professions of Faith: Seven members of the community made professions of faith.
- Baptisms March 6, 2022: 6 young members were Baptized in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit.
- Community Day June, 2022: 70 children and 40 adult community members enjoyed fellowship, musical entertainment, bounce house, games, and hot dogs & hamburgers.
- Vacation Bible School June and July, 2022
- Five different teams from Virginia and Texas made their way to Cannon Ball to aid in the Christian education of our children during the summer. They are also given lunch and/or dinner and gifting of various items, shoes, school supplies, etc.
- Elder Christmas Dinner December 8, 2022 for 52 Elders: this dinner has been an annual event since 2003. It is to honor the Elders here that do so much in guiding and in some cases raising the children in this community. Various outstanding Elders are invited from other communities as well.
- Christmas Celebration December, 2022: Christmas usually held at the south campus building, was held at the Cannon Ball Elementary due to the growth of this event. There were 95 children and 50 adults in attendance. Gifts were given to all in attendance as well as a brown bag lunch. The Christmas story was enacted by the children for their parents. It was a glorious day!
- Each week we have Adult Worship Service at the north campus with an average attendance of 25 adults.
- Children's Church held at the south campus with an average attendance of 32 children with a meal provided.
- Men's Bible Study weekly, Monday night with an attendance of 6-15 and meal provided.
- Adult Bible Study weekly, Tuesday night north campus, with average attendance of 10
- Ladies Bible Study average attendance of 16 with a meal provided.
- Children's Bible Study weekly, Thursday night with an average attendance of eight, with a meal provided.
- Food Pantry We provide a food pantry once a month on the next to last Wednesday of the month. We purchase, inventory and store the food until the day before the pantry. We pack each box individually, weighing each box. Each box contains dry goods, canned food and frozen meat. At this time we serve 164 families.
- Equine Ministry for the past ten years we have held a horse camp for children, and at a separate time, riding for women from the community. Through this ministry and other outreach programs that are made available to us through Sitting Bull College, we believe that the children and ladies may be reached by the Gospel. The Equine Ministry is solely provided for by separate donations from outside donors who are in agreement with our philosophy that "horses heal." We also maintain a small benevolence fund for community emergencies.

Thank you for your support of this ministry. Without your participation, and the help of other generous donors, we would not be able to provide assistance for many of our children, women and men, meeting the needs of their spiritual and physical lives.


