On Humility

As we journey through life, and on our Lenten Journey, we come across all sorts of things that are confusing to many. The question surfaces: 'Why is humility such a big deal to a Christian?'

We are in the midst of Lent. We are anticipating Holy Week. This is a time for spiritual renewal, but we are not always sure that we are following the right kind of path to Easter! Humility keeps us on the right path.

One of the reasons that I love to follow the Church Year and explore each of the seasons is that we find a natural path of Spiritual growth laid out for us.

In addition, things that seem backwards in the Scriptures have to do with letting God be God in your life, and having an attitude of gratitude to God for the gift of life. Letting God's word speak to us, to be humble before God, letting God be God in your life, is the gift of life. If we let self have its way in our lives, it ruins our growth in the Spirit of God.

James 4:10 says; "Humble yourselves before the Lord, and he will exalt you." That seems to go against what we learn in life. We have to be successful! We have to be 'self-motivated' to be successful. This seems to be the guiding principle of a successful person of the world. However, it does not fulfill us!

How many 'successful people,' that you know about, are satisfied with their lives. We see people of every walk of life seeking 'fulfillment.' Doesn't this quote from James seem out of place?

Well, then check this out! Matthew 11:28-30

<u>"28</u> Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. <u>29</u> Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. <u>30</u> For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light." Executive Director of Ministries Doug Leet A Frugal Mind...and a Generous Heart

"But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes on you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth." Acts 1:8 (NIV)

In Charity Lutheran's preamble to its constitution, the verse noted above is referenced with one of the eight areas that Charity is called to as a congregation: "Witness to the community, nation, and world."

Charity has supported Lutheran Asian Ministries (LAM) since its inception (11 years ago), and before that supported its predecessor organization, Lutheran Vietnamese Ministries. LAM is an international partner of Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ (LCMC) and has expanded its mission work into Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, Myanmar (formerly Burma), in addition to Vietnam, with a regional population of about 241 million people. Three of these countries fall into the top 30 countries persecuting Christians.

Please see the update in this newsletter from Pastor Mark Vander Tuig, who serves as LAM's Ministry Coordinator. Charity's generous support for LAM in spreading the good news of Jesus to the people of Southeast Asia is helping to make a difference in that region.

As individuals, a big part of what allows us to be generous is our attitude towards money. To quote Charity member Sue B. Balcom, "Let go of the idea that money equals happiness. Money being the center of our happiness can create more problems and may

encourage you to spend more money and potentially be miserable in the end." Sue B. also mentioned, "The quote, 'If you live for having it all, what you have is never enough' is attributed to Vicki Robin, author of Your Money or Your Life (one of the best books on Frugal Living!)." She added, "The quote is a bit of a punch in the gut...because we know, deep down, that it is absolutely true."

In this section of the monthly newsletter, we will attempt to describe ways that Charity has a generous heart by highlighting a featured mission organization, and maybe offer some ideas on how we can serve our neighbors. We also welcome you to provide any "frugal" tips or personal practices that help in reducing household expenses. I will bet you 10 dollars to a Dilly Bar (updated due to inflationary pressures) that Sue B. has some of those to share as well!

UPDATE I was right! Sue B. came through with a few practical ideas to help save household dollars. I guess we shouldn't be surprised that at the top of her list was: "Learn to cook!" and "Eat leftovers!" I will spread her other tips out over upcoming newsletters. But to give you an example of one of Sue B.'s practices that I'm aware of; she would save her used coffee grounds and add them to her garden as fertilizer.

Vision Council Update

Greetings from the Vision Council. I hope you all have been enjoying this weather as much as I have. It is a nice break from last year's endless snow and now spring is right around the corner.

At the February Vision Council, we got our first review of the 2024 proposed budget versus January's actual income and expenses. I am very pleased with how well it matched up. We have a surplus with the unfilled Pastor and Youth Coordinator positions but as those positions are filled income and expenses are going to align with the proposed 2024 budget presented at the Annual Voter's Assembly. God has provided all of our needs through his faithful givers and a diligent staff.

A significant amount of our time was also dedicated to getting our Core Ministries organization and structure back in line with our member needs and best practices. In 2023 a self-forming committee came together identifying themselves as the "Adult Education Committee". They filled an immediate need and much needed function in Charity Lutheran. Now we need to duplicate their success with our other ministry areas with accountability, reporting, and communication paths and processes keeping leadership, staff, and membership up to date and involved. The utilization of Core Ministries is not new to Charity but the turmoil of the last decade has seen many of the best practices fall to the wayside.

A new item on our agenda in February was exploring the possibility of forming a new geographic district in the LCMC covering all the congregations in our state. The formation of a regional district would give churches in that region an opportunity to work together for developing best practices in ministry, sharing of resources and skills, and developing relationships with our neighboring LCMC congregations. We plan to reach out to our LCMC neighbors with an invitation to an event sponsored by Charity in late April. An LCMC representative would be scheduled to lead a discussion about the process of forming a district and the benefits for member churches.

I will close as always with a reminder and invitation to corporate prayer every Tuesday at 6:30 PM.


Upcoming Men's Bible Study



Lutheran Asian Ministries Update

Because of our generous and faithful supporters, we were able to once again travel to Southeast Asia this last November. This trip we went to focus on just three of the five countries that we serve: Thailand, Laos, and Cambodia. Our mission is to train and equip indigenous leaders and work with them toward self-sufficiency. We were able to do that on this trip!



We started in Thailand and met with missionaries, Mike and Dara Rasavanh serving just outside of Bangkok. They were in the beginning stages of putting up a church building and needed financial help with getting the concrete footings and floor poured. In January, one of the agencies also working in the area was going to bring 60 men from the US to put up the building. Our gift allowed that initial work to be completed! When the next agency arrived they could immediately start, and in 9 days finished the church! We also re-connected with one of the seminaries that we support, Bangkok Theological Seminary. There were many other connections made in Thailand but it was time to move on to Laos.

In Laos we had two primary goals: to travel to the northern region of the country to check on the progress of the development of another church building, and to travel to the southern part of the country to visit with leaders of a church located on a large island. The northern church is led by a pastor who has done great work in growing the congregation and helping them to see the value of establishing a church. They have done all the work to set up the building, but had no funds to finish the inside. Our financial support allowed them to hang lights, put in a basic sound system and provide seating. The building can hold about 200 people and now they can all fit and hear and have room to sit! In southern Laos, the church on the island serves 1000 in worship but their building was only half done! Here our financial support was able to finish the building so that there is now room for all 1000 worshipers! The congregation is led by 5 pastors, all volunteers, but all deeply committed to the Gospel. At this last Christmas they had over 2500 people come to worship!

Flying to Cambodia allowed us to participate in a youth gathering for about 100 young people from across the nation. This was a training event to help these young believers share their faith with their friends and family. It was amazing to see their strong desire to bring others into a relationship with Jesus. Here too we met with our leader in Cambodia and as he introduced us to the pastors he supports; we saw again the amazing work being done there. Our pastor there supports 15 ministry sites throughout the nation and will also spend time in the neighboring country that is not open to the Gospel. There he must be very careful not to alert the authorities so that he can continue to support and encourage the leaders of almost 50 house churches, primarily in the central part of the country,

We were not able get to Vietnam or Myanmar on this trip, but our executive director, Pastor Tom Lovan is in constant communication with them and all our pastors and leaders in all five nations. We are grateful for Charity Lutheran's support and will do our very best to be good stewards of all that we receive!


Holy Week
