Intentional Interim Senior Pastor Brad Miller From the Pastor

By the time this newsletter is in the mail, Norlyn Swenson and I will be on our way to Ukraine. We invite your prayers for our safety and effectiveness. Based upon past experience, there will be daily occasions when we are offered tea – with or without bergamot is the big local distinction. There will also be occasions when we are offered a chance to sample the local beer – which we may or may not politely accept.

Alcohol is an interesting insight to church history and the global dispersal of denominations. For the first 18 centuries of Christianity, pretty much everybody consumed alcohol.

It was commonplace in Biblical times and "wine" is mentioned more than 200 times in the Bible. Turning water into wine was Jesus' first public miracle. Wine is treated topically in scripture much like sex: as a good thing and a blessing which can become a bad thing and a curse outside of proper limits and boundaries. Sex is good and proper within marriage, but adultery is bad. Wine is good to drink and to offer as a sacrifice, but drunkenness is bad.

A curious thing happened in the United States for a century from 1830 to 1930: the Temperance Movement. It started as a healthy appeal against drunkenness during a time when awareness of social ills was coupled with early advocacy for nutritional literacy.

As the movement picked up speed, it took on the character of a moral crusade which declared that good people don't consume alcohol at all. It culminated with the attempt to stop all people from consuming alcohol with Prohibition – enforced by the 18th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution in 1919. By 1933, Americans were fed up with the experiment and they ratified the 21st Amendment which repealed the 18th Amendment.

Executive Director of Ministries Doug Leet The Flying "V"

We are blessed in our neck of the woods. How many of us go outdoors on a beautiful spring day and appreciate the wonderful honking sounds of Canada geese flying overhead, some high, some low enough to see their black head and white markings around the face, but all in some semblance of a V-shaped formation? We get to experience all four seasons, and from my own perspective, by the end of each season I'm ready for the next one. And that change is all the more sweet after persevering through some of the trials and extremes of the former season.

In Ecclesiastes 3:1-2, Solomon writes, "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven: a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot."

There are things to learn from Canadian honkers. A Library of Congress article notes their flying formation serves two important purposes: "First, it conserves their energy. Each bird flies slightly above the bird in front of them, resulting in a reduction of wind resistance. The birds take turns being in front, falling back when they get tired. In this way, the geese can fly for a long time before they must stop (up to 71% greater flying range than if each bird were flying alone). The second benefit to the "V" formation is that it is easy to keep track of every bird in the group. Flying in formation may assist with the communication and coordination within the group."

If a bird falls out of formation, it will suddenly feel drag and resistance. So it will seek to return to the flock and away from isolation. The result is a natural sense of community and common purpose, giving direction and focus for each one.

This is the same sense and a need of belonging that is vital for a Christian in being attached to the Body of Christ. And their incessant honking also seems to serve a good purpose: encouraging those birds in the lead to keep going and keep up the speed.

The writer of Hebrews exhorts in Chapter 10:24-25, "And let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, not giving up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but encouraging one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching."

We find ourselves in a new reality at Charity with a smaller weekly worship service attendance (174 to year-to-date including Holy Week services), thus less contributions to our general fund budget. Throughout the remainder of the year, Charity's leadership, both on staff and the Vision Council, are working to monitor and adjust our expenditures to get them more in line with the actual income Charity is receiving. The financial chart on this page indicates that year-to-date we have \$35,000 less in actual income than we do in actual expenses.

This timeline of history is important because it overlapped the growth of certain denominations in the United States: notably Baptists and the Assemblies of God. Leaders in both groups shrewdly rode the cultural wave of the Temperance Movement and effectively co-branded their religious preaching with the not-particularly-Bible demonization of alcohol.

Hence, my shock on my first mission trip to England decades ago when a Baptist host pastor offered me a beer. I sputtered my incredulous: "but you're Baptist!" He laughed and explained that basic Baptist theology had nothing to do with bans on alcohol and that: "that was an American thing." Indeed, he was correct.

So if you travel in Africa or behind the old Iron Curtain and you encounter a Baptist pastor, they may or may not share a frosty mug with you! Whether they do depends upon whether they were trained by Baptist missionaries from USA or Baptist missionaries from UK.

So, if you encounter your Baptist or AG neighbor at a local liquor store, do the kind thing and don't harass them! People today choose not to drink for all sorts of good reasons: the carbs, the calories, the interaction with prescription medications, addiction, or just taste preference. All of those are good and proper. Just don't let anybody try to hornswoggle you with some bogus argument about it being Biblical. When we twist the Bible into a prideful PR tool to vainly decorate our mere preferences, then we disrespect the great gift that God has given us in His Word.





Thank you, dear Charity Church family for supporting me and Revival Prayer Fellowship. Since January 1st I have been traveling to courthouses across the state. I have been in 41 county courthouses, and prayed for many elected officials, sheriff's departments and others that work in county courthouses along with local churches and clergy. It has been an eye-opening experience; 3,000 miles traveled and still have more to go. I have met people who are courageous to share their faith and others who are fearful of pressure from government agencies. Every person that I asked about the condition of our country agreed with me when I said, our country is in trouble and we must pray. On my Facebook page, RPFGLOBAL, I have pictures and videos of many of the courthouses.

Praying for people in authority is such an important part of the Christian life. Pastors, churches, board members, elected officials in our state, elected officials in Washington DC, local school boards, law enforcement personnel, etc... all need God's grace and direction. Pray with me for these who have been seated in authority that they might be diligent about doing what is right and doing what is righteous.

Pray for me as I finish visiting and praying in the remaining 12 courthouses.

National Day of Prayer is May 3rd and 4th. May 3rd is a first ever youth prayer movement gathering, meeting at Century High School auditorium with many students leading this large group of teens in a prayer service. May 4 at the Capitol at noon there will be hundreds that meet to pray. May 4 in the evening hundreds will gather in the Russell Reid Auditorium at the North Dakota Heritage Center. These meetings will make a difference in the lives of those who attend and in the lives of those who are prayed for.

This fall we are planning a prayer summit for pastors. Pray for pastors to attend and to be stirred in their souls. Details are in the making and our goal is 50+ pastors from all denominations.


