A BRIEF REVIEW OF WHY WE CELEBRATE REFORMATION SUNDAY

While the rest of the world celebrates a spooky holiday, the Lutheran Christian community, for the most part, celebrates Reformation Day; although, admittedly, many Lutherans have lost sight of the reasons behind the Reformation. Martin Luther's study of the scripture led him to a path he recognized as religious truth and salvation. He disagreed with the church's teachings of the Bible, with the priests serving as intermediaries between the Bible and the laity. He also strongly disagreed with the sale of indulgences whose proceeds were used to rebuild the church.

Luther is said to have posted his 'Ninety-five Theses' (95 points of discussion within the academic community in which he served as a teacher), on the door of the Castle Church, Wittenberg, Germany, on October 31, 1517. This was on the eve of All Saints' Day. This became the traditional day for remembering the start of the Reformation.

Many opposed the movements of the church, but Martin Luther brought it to light and sought reformation within the church. His theses gave grounds for people to question the church; it was a time of large religious and social change. Luther preached reformation, but his thesis was warped for political, social, and economic reasons by various emerging leaders of the movement. This brought about a fractionalization in the Roman Catholic Church and the emergence of the Protestant Reformation. Reformation Day is recognized by a number of communities around the world, especially the Protestants. It is an official holiday in most German states and seeks to celebrate the significant religious reforms brought on by "The 95 Theses." Reformation Day stands by truth and the Bible as the sole source of religious authority.

Executive Director of Ministries Doug Leet Lift Up a Banner!

Displaying banners in churches is not a twentieth century invention. In fact, Scripture mentions their use repeatedly in both the Old and New Testaments. In writing for Reformed Worship, Doreen Kellogg lists five ways that banners are used in a meaningful way as we gather and worship:

Banners Identify Us Early on in the Bible in Numbers 1 and 2 God tells the children of Israel to camp in tribal groups around the tabernacle and erect banners to identify their clans.

Banners Call Us to Gather and Proclaim the Truth "In that day the Root of Jesse will stand as a banner for the peoples; the nations will rally to him, and his resting place will be glorious." Isaiah 11:10 During the four Sundays of Advent, Charity displays a banner, "From the stump of Jesse," in the form of four weekly wall panels that beautifully depict the lineage of Jesus from Jesse, David's father.

Banners Guide Us in Our

Spiritual Battles "Lift up a banner in the land! Blow the trumpet among the nations!" Jeremiah 51:27 Christians need encouragement as we face spiritual battles.

Banners Announce Our Victory

"We will shout for joy when you are victorious and will lift up our banners in the name of our God." Psalm 20:5

Banners Keep the Truth Before Us

Banners can help to be visual reminders of God's presence, God's truth, God's ways, and God's promises. Charity has used a variety of banners as visual reminders. From the Holy, Holy,

Holy banner along the west wall, to the altar cloths, or paraments, to celebrate liturgical seasons.

A favorite are the bright cloths that are displayed on the altar, baptismal font, and lectern during Pentecost.

A banner that we hope to reclaim as we celebrate Reformation Sunday in October is the one that has gone missing in recent years, Charity's Reformation banner (see attached photo). It proclaims the main principles of the Reformation, the five Solas, or Alones:

- Sola scriptura: "Word alone"
- Sola fide: "Faith alone"
- Sola gratia: "Grace alone"
- Solo Christo: "Christ alone"
- Soli Deo Gloria: "to the glory of God alone"

In a circular pattern, it reads: "Salvation by Grace Alone, through Faith Alone, in Christ Alone, on the authority of God's Word Alone."

Being reminded of these Reformation principles helps to keep us firmly grounded within Biblical Christian orthodoxy, without looking to other people to mediate our relationship with any part of our Triune God.

The world of the late medieval Roman Catholic Church was a complex one. Over time, the western church and particularly the office of the pope in Rome, had become deeply involved in the political life of western Europe. This mixing of the civil authority and the authority of the church contributed to abuses. These abuses were mostly surrounding the practice of the sale of indulgences or spiritual privileges by the clergy, with the full approval of the leaders in Rome. Luther and other reformers objected to this, but the posting of the Theses by Dr. Luther triggered the public objections. The final result was the expulsion of those reformers from the church in Rome.

But the church at large enjoyed loyalty as it had before. One development is clear: the political authorities increasingly sought to curtail the public role of the church and thereby triggered tension. *That tension continues to this day with the separation of the church and state here in this country.*

We as modern day Lutherans celebrate the return of the Church to the Word of God as the guiding light for our Spiritual Journey. We should not take this opportunity to misdirect our ideas about others, but to celebrate Jesus Christ as the cornerstone and study and apply the Word of God as the guide for our daily living. So with that being said, we will continue to celebrate the Lordship of Jesus Christ within our Christian Community!

Charity Call Committee Report

Since first beginning to advertise for our new pastor in January, here is a brief summary of our activity on the Call Committee:

We received 14 applications from individuals across the U.S. as well as a few other countries. Of those, we have interviewed six via Zoom. For each of these, we had a minimum of one meeting prior to the interview.

We have listened to several sermons and portions of church services from each applicant, and Beth Allen had multiple phone conversations with them gathering additional information prior to the interviews. She also had phone interviews with three other applicants we didn't interview.

This summer, Scott Carter traveled to the home church of one candidate to hear him preach and visit with him more. And, Andrea reached out to several references some applicants provided.

Because we haven't yet found the right pastor to call for Charity, we continue with our search. We have reached out to the LCMC about more strategies for reaching applicants and we have brainstormed ideas with other churches and pastors.

We are in the process of refreshing and reformatting the job position that is available to interested candidates. And, we keep moving forward, praying for God's guidance as we do. Please keep praying for God to show us the right person to be our next pastor.

Who was Saint Stephen?

In the book of Acts, Chapter 6, Stephen was chosen to provide caring ministry to those in need. Since the days of the Apostles, caring ministry has been a hallmark of the Christian faith community.

As the Apostles worked to continue the ministry of Jesus Christ as his elders, some of the Greek-speaking widows were being neglected in their daily distribution. The Twelve decided to ordain seven deacons to oversee their care. In doing so, the deacons extended the pastoral care of the Apostles, the first Bishops of the early Church.

So, the Twelve called a full meeting of the disciples and addressed them, 'It would not be right for us to neglect the word of God to give out food; you, brothers, must select from among yourselves seven men of good reputation, filled with the Spirit and with wisdom, to whom we can hand over this duty. We ourselves will continue to devote ourselves to prayer and to the service of the word.' The whole assembly approved of this proposal and elected Stephen, a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit,

Acts: Chapter 6, 2 – 5

That is what Stephen Ministry helps the church do today.

God Doesn't Want Us To Walk Alone
